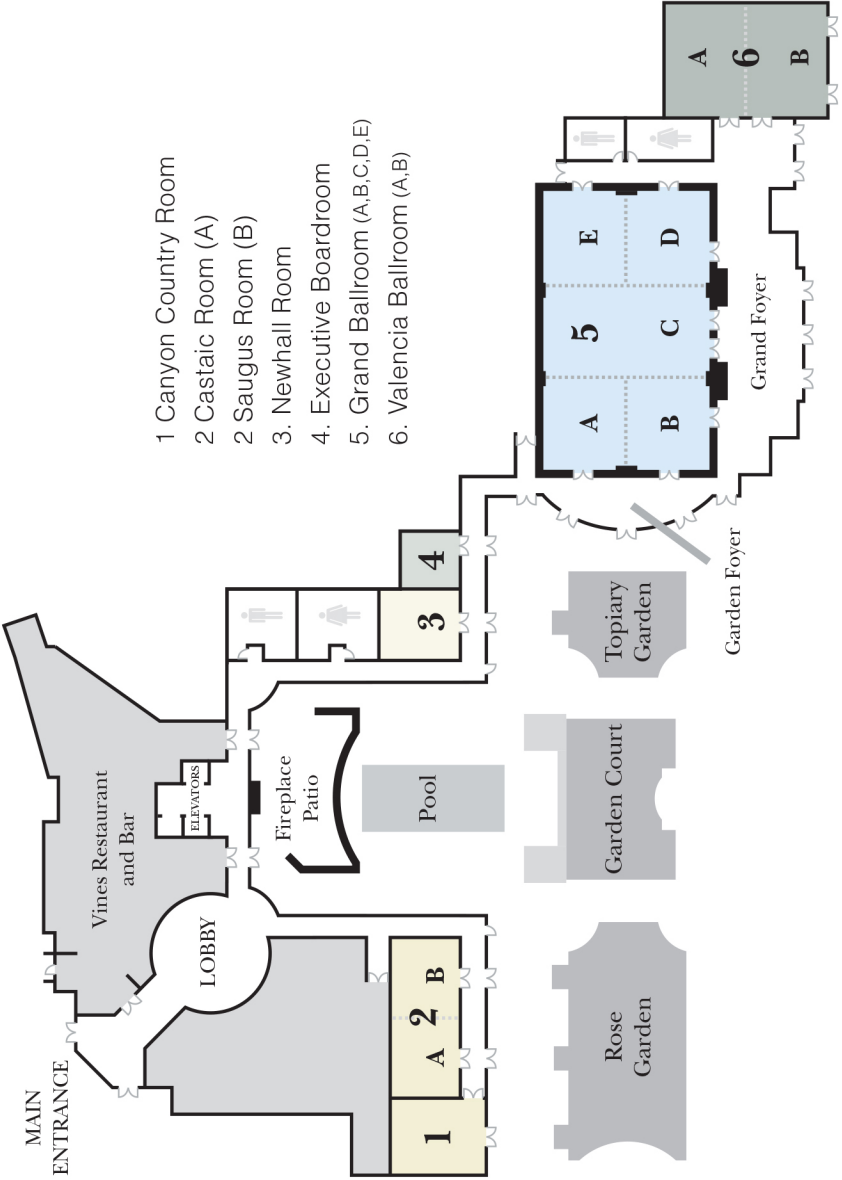

**Darla Cooper**

**Executive Director, The RP Group**

Dr. Darla M. Cooper is an educational leader and expert in research and evaluation dedicated to using inquiry, data, and evidence to improve the lives of all community college students. After serving for the past several years as the Director of Research and Evaluation for the Research and Planning Group for the California Community Colleges (The

RP Group), Dr. Cooper was recently selected to be the Executive Director for the organization.

Dr. Cooper has worked in the California Community College system for almost 20 years, having previously held institutional research director positions at Santa Barbara City College, Oxnard College, and Ohlone College. She led Student Support (Re)defined, a landmark research project that examined what supports student success, and has been invited to present on this work at various venues across the state.

She also recently served as one of the coaches for the American Association of Community Colleges' (AACC) Pathways Project, is on the advisory committee for the California Guided Pathways Project, and is currently co-directing a research study funded by the College Futures Foundation that will examine what happens with students who appear ready to transfer, but do not.

She has extensive experience serving as an external evaluator for several federal and private foundation grants, and has worked on various other projects designed to promote student success including the Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence, the RP Group's Bridging Research Information and Culture (BRIC) initiative, Student Transfer in Professional Pathways Project, and Accreditation Study.

Dr. Cooper also has direct experience assisting students in achieving their educational goals in her previous work at the University of Southern California as a director of research and information, student services counselor, and ombudsperson. She holds a BA in Psychology from the University of California, San Diego, and an MSEd and EdD from the University of Southern California.

**J. Noah Brown**  
**President and Chief Executive Officer, Association of**  
**Community College Trustees**

J. Noah Brown is a widely recognized and award-winning higher education policy and governance expert, author, and educator whose experience spans more than three decades in the nation's capital working in the nonprofit sector. Noah has served as president and chief executive officer of the

Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) since 2005 and has worked for the association since 1996. He also serves on the faculty for the Doctorate in Community College Leadership program at Ferris State University in Michigan. Noah's inaugural book, *First in the World: Community Colleges and America's Future*, won the 2013 Bellwether Book Award.

Noah has earned a reputation as a popular speaker at a wide array of events, including college commencement and convocation ceremonies, international conferences, state college association conventions and other events. He has been featured in *PARADE* magazine's "Intelligence Report" and has contributed writing to a number of publications, currently serving as a contributing columnist to *FE News*, one of the United Kingdom's foremost further-education publications, and is a regular commentator for Higher Education Talk Radio.

At ACCT, Noah provides national leadership on behalf of more than 6,000 elected and appointed officials governing 1,200 community colleges throughout the United States. Much of his work has focused on strengthening the strategic connections between community college boards and the array of national and state organizations important to supporting the mission of community colleges. In addition to its focus on advocacy, ACCT also provides trustee education and board leadership services to its member boards.

Noah has served in a number of leadership capacities. Katie Hern, Ed.D., is an English Instructor at Chabot College and Co-Founder and Executive Director of the California Acceleration Project (CAP), a professional development network that supports the state's 114 community colleges to transform remediation and increase student completion and equity. Colleges in the CAP network are seeing dramatic gains in completion of college English and math by using high school grades for course placement, replacing traditional remedial courses with co-requisite models, tailoring math remediation to students' chosen program of study, and teaching with high-challenge, high-support pedagogy. Hern's publications focus on the community college acceleration movement, the need to reform policies for placing students into English and math courses, design principles for teaching with high challenge, high support pedagogy, and the equity imperative of transforming remediation. Hern began teaching English composition at Bowling Green State University in Ohio in 1991. Her past roles include serving as Co-Director of California's Faculty Inquiry Network and Dean of Academic Affairs for John F. Kennedy University. She holds a doctorate in Educational Leadership from Mills College. Along with CAP Co-Founder Myra Snell, Hern was named to the Washington Monthly's "16 Most Innovative People in Higher Education" in 2016.

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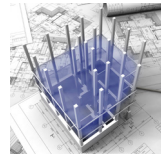

Chancellor Eloy Ortiz Oakley has stated, “The economy is unforgiving to those without skills.” An estimated 65 percent of jobs of the future will require college credentials and 80 percent will require digital skills. Additionally, automation and artificial intelligence are projected to take many jobs. An estimated 2.5 million workers in California are “stranded” meaning that for a variety of reasons, they cannot access traditional ways to gain the skills and industry-valued credentials necessary for economic resiliency. This presentation will share insights about “stranded” workers and key policy elements in the governor’s proposed online community college intended to address the needs of these Californians.

**Implementing AB705 & Re-envisioning the Capacity of California Community College Students (G, SS)**

AB 705, which passed the California State Legislature unanimously and was signed into law in October 2017, requires community colleges to use high school grades for placement in English and math to give students the best possible chance of completing transfer-level courses within one year. All California Community Colleges will have to work to make meaningful changes to their assessment, placement, student support services, and academic supports to meet critically important goals of the law. Four panelists pivotal to this change for the system will discuss what college leaders will need to know and should expect under the new law.

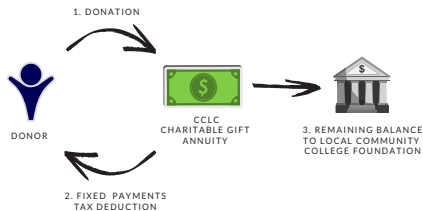
