More students attend part-time




One in five Californian adults have some college education but no degree.




Educational attainment is not equitable.

Californians Aged 25-64 with Some College, But No Degree, 2016






Adults with some college, but no degree, are concentrated in lower-paying occupations



Reality: Accessing Limited Financial Aid

Eligibility Restrictions	Policy Inequities
Age and residency restrictions	• Low probability of award receipt
• High school graduation timing	• Award does not cover total cost of attendance
• Need for full time enrollment	• Historically low adjustment for inflation
